I recently had an opportunity to meet with the security officers at City Hall. These CUPE Local 15 members provide in-house security to protect the staff, the building, and the public.

This very important job includes ensuring everybody is safe, monitoring people that enter and exit the building, performing perimeter checks, along with many other

responsibilities. In-house security staff are handpicked by the employer to become part of a team where it is essential that they work closely together and trust each other. This in turn increases morale in the workplace, which subsequently creates a healthy working environment.

Everyone benefits from this. This workplace doesn't have a huge turnover which means the security guards know each other, know the worksite, and have the experience to

competently do their job. Subsequently, the staff at City Hall trust in these members to protect them.

In other worksites it is common for security staff to work with private contractors. This can be difficult when different security guards, who do not know the worksite, staff, or people who shouldn't be in the building, are assigned to a worksite.

Hopefully the City continues to hire more inhouse security for all sites.

I want to thank all the guards who shared their experience and their love of the job with me. They are a great bunch of people.

November 11th is Remembrance Day. This is the day to remember the pain and suffering of millions who had no peace and have no peace. It's a day that we dedicate ourselves to do better, be more compassionate, be more understanding, and a day to take hold of the lessons learned at the expense of millions of lives and pledge ourselves to not let it happen again.

Singer and Songwriter, Edwin Starr, said "War, what is it good for..."? "...Absolutely nothing, it has one friend and that's the undertaker..."

Many learned politicians disagree with this sentiment and world events show this to be true.

The many abstentions and votes opposed by the West on the UN resolution, which called for "an immediate, durable and sustained humanitarian truce leading to a cessation of hostilities" between Israel and Palestine makes my head spin. The vote did garner the twothirds necessary to pass, but there were 14 opposed and 45 abstentions. What message are they sending our children?

It was similar on the vote requiring Russia's immediate withdrawal from Ukraine. It also passed, but with seven opposed and 32 abstentions.

National Indigenous Veterans Day This day commemorates Indigenous contributions, particularly in World War I, World War II, and the Korean War by First

Nations, Metis, and Inuit soldiers. It was first established in Winnipeg in 1994 to recognize the long and distinguished legacy of service in the Canadian Armed Forces and the Indigenous lives that were impacted and lost protecting Canada. Many Indigenous men shared their valuable skills when they joined the military. Skills such as hunting, scouting, patience, marksmanship, and code talking etc., helped



them to gather information on enemy positions and translate messages into Cree and back into English in case the enemy intercepted any

communications. At least 50 decorations for bravery were earned by Indigenous soldiers during the First World War. This year will be our third year attending the ceremony at Victory Square Cenotaph in Vancouver and we are honored to be able to represent CUPE Local 15 at such an important event. A wreath was laid on behalf of the Local.

Remembrance Day

Every year on November 11th, Canadians commemorate and honour Canada's Veterans and the fallen. You may have also heard it being called Armistice Day by some. This is because the Armistice agreement was signed between Germany and the Allied Forces on November 11, 1918. The ceasefire went into effect at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. Canadian soldiers were instrumental in WWI and the capturing of Vimy Ridge, which withstood all attacks for two years and is the site of Canada's National Memorial. They also achieved much success in taking over areas that were occupied by the enemy and held the line when the Germans launched their last big offensive in Amiens. In the air, Canadian airmen excelled in aerial combat and the Canadian naval support with the Royal Navy helped carry out antisubmarine operations. There is much for us to be proud of, but this day is to also recognize the sacrifices that were made by so many.

- (1) Upon the office being notified of the following occurrences, the Society shall provide either flowers or a fruit basket, or make a donation to a specified charity, at a total cost of up to \$100.
 - Death of a member or retired member.
 - Serious illness or injury of a member where absence exceeds two weeks.
 - iii) Death of an immediate family member, including spouse, child, parent, or sibling.
 - iv) Birth or adoption of a child.

CUPE NATIONAL CONVENTION 2023

Call for Political **Activism**

The CUPE National Convention was informative and interactive. CUPE has a unique advantage in being able to educate the public about the problems of contracting out and the need to elect labour friendly candidates to office.

The solution lies in political outreach to the voting public by CUPE members across the country.

Every month, we will be on the street with a tent interacting with people by distributing either food or something else essential and I encourage other members to volunteer 20 hours a year.

I recently participated in a Baishaki Mela with another CUPE member in the CUPE tent on Fraser Street and am pleased to report that our interaction with the public was very positive. This outreach is very effective

when done directly or collectively, rather than by a third party such as the United Way.

I believe a fund of 0.5% to 1% of the budget should be allocated for this purpose. I also believe that CUPE members should be encouraged to run for office. This would elevate our position from beggar to negotiator.

At the CUPE-SCFP 31st Biennial **National Convention, Quebec 2023**

This was a valuable experience. I have been a CUPE Local 15 member for 18 years and a year and a half ago I started attending union meetings. I had been on the PACE Board for three years, where every year the board steps down, and is, or is not re-elected.

I commenced attending the union meetings as a proud union worker and I am ever thankful for the support I have received from stewards, national reps, and union negotiators. I was nominated and elected to attend the convention as a Member-at-Large. Over the five days of the convention, I attended the Bystander Intervention Training, Health Care Sectoral Meeting, Pensions Forum, Delegates Reception, 2SLGBTQI+ Workers' Caucus, CUPE British Columbia Caucus, Human Rights Forum, Convention Social, Election Caucus-RVP British Columbia and Yukon, Global Justice Forum, and the Convention Rally in front of Quebec Parliament buildings.

Provincially and nationally we are fighting privatization, and to decrease the wage gap. At the Pensions Forum we learned about the history of the pension fund, and concerns querying pension investments in the global south. The grand reception featured food and a Quebecois Band teaching dance steps. Monday started with the 2SLGBTQIA+ workers' caucus. I am thankful to see 2S start the acronym. Here, I met the Pink Triangle committee.

The convention room was incredible to see, with just under 3,000 workers representing almost three quarters of a million workers from coast to coast to coast. It was amazing to bear witness to democratic communication, to hear various works, and to hear sectors have their voices heard. There were many resolutions brought forward drafted by various unions from across the land.

The first resolution we passed was Emergency Resolution No. 801 submitted by the National Executive Board:

CUPE-SCFP WILL:

- Reiterate our condemnation of the Hamas attacks on October 7, 2023;
- 2. Call for an end to Israel's total siege of Gaza, which is prohibited under International Law;
- 3. Call on the Canadian Government to:
 - Advocate for the release of all hostages;
 - Demand a ceasefire and life-saving humanitarian assistance for Gazans;
 - Support International Criminal Court (ICC) and International Court of Justice (ICJ) investigations of war crimes;
 - Condemn all acts of antisemitism, and anti-Palestinian hate and Islamophobia;
 - Focus on building a just peace in the
- 4. Stand with all people in Israel and Palestine who yearn for peace, freedom and security.

BECAUSE:

CUPE-SCFP has long recognized the need for a peace process based on the implementation of UN resolutions, international law and respect for human rights.

This resolution was passed, and was a beautiful, interesting, tough, and peaceful way to commence the Resolutions part of convention.

I learned how the rules of order function in a space of just under 3,000 union workers. There were reports, elections, speakers, and awards, and the Strategic Directions Report was debated for two days.
