

Notices of Motion

1. Preferential Ballot

The Executive recommends amending Bylaw 13 - Election of Officers to allow for a preferential ballot as follows: (Bold denotes new language and strike out denotes deleted language.)

- 13.3.1 The election of officers will be held during the month of May in each year. The election will be conducted electronically using a **preferential ballot** on an online system approved by the membership. To be elected a candidate must receive the majority of the votes cast.
- The online polls will open at least seven days prior to the Annual General Meeting and remain open until midnight on the day preceding the Annual General Meeting. The results, including notice for runoff votes (if any) shall be announced at the AGM, posted on the Local union's website, and sent via email to all members who have provided email addresses.
- In the event run off votes are required the online polls will reopen at 10:00 a.m. on the Monday following the AGM and remain open until 10:00 a.m. Friday. The results will then be posted on the Local union's website, and sent via email to all members who have provided email addresses. Should subsequent run off votes be required, the online polls will reopen the following Monday(s) at 10:00 a.m. and remain open until 10:00 a.m. on the Friday(s) following.
- 13.3.43 Only members of a sector as defined in Section 12 may vote for the Member(s) at Large from the same sector.

Explanation:

In 13.3.1 inserting the words "preferential ballot" renders the last sentence in 13.3.1 redundant and eliminates the need for run-off voting. A preferential ballot would still require a "majority of the votes cast". The proposed language is written clearly and succinctly as any ambiguity and unnecessary verbiage may not allow for approval from CUPE National.

Preferential voting is a system of voting in which members indicate their first, second, third, and lower choices of multiple candidates for a single office. If no candidate receives a majority of first choices, the second, and if necessary, subsequent choices are added to the first choices, until one candidate has the majority.

The online ballot would allow the elector to rate the candidates in order of their preference and the results would be calculated all at once by the election provider at the close of the poll, decreasing the time of the election to seven days only. Complete election results would be announced at the Annual General Meeting and the successful candidates could be sworn in and assume office right away.
